



One Brain-Two Grammars?
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On the dualistic nature of discourse processing: Linguistic and neurolinguistic observations

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In the paper to be presented it is argued that there is converging evidence in support of the hypothesis that linguistic discourse has a dualistic organization which is based on the distinction between a microstructure and a macrostructure. This distinction shows significant neurolinguistic correlations, and these correlations concern the lateralization of the human brain.
